

# The University of Western Ontario SOCIOLOGY 3341F-001 The Social Construction of Gender Fall 2024

## **Delivery Method - In-person**

<u>Course Description:</u> The course will consider the ways in which our view of gender has changed from one that saw gender as an attribute of individuals to one that sees gender as a social construction that shapes social life. Implications of this change for gender inequality will also be explored.

*Prerequisite(s):* Registration in third year or above.

Unless you have either the prerequisites or written special permission from your Dean to enroll in the course, you may be removed from this course and it will be deleted from your record. The decision may not be appealed. You will receive no adjustment to your fees in the event that you are dropped from a course for failing to have the necessary prerequisites.

#### **Course Objectives and Learning Outcomes:**

By the end of the course, students should be able to:

- \*Analyze how gender interacts with race, ethnicity, class, sexuality, and other dimensions of identity.
- \*Examine the nature and content of gender inequality, particularly in North American societies.
- \*Evaluate the strengths and weaknesses of varying theories of gender development and feminist theories.
- \*Demonstrate competency in oral and written communication skills.

#### **Communication:**

Students are responsible for checking the course OWL Brightspace site (https://westernu.brightspace.com/d2l/login) on a regular basis for news and updates. This is the primary method by which information will be disseminated to all students in the class.

Students are responsible for attending classes, read weekly assigned material ahead of class, and to actively participate in class discussions/activities. ## **Method of Evaluation:**

The evaluation methods described in the course outline are essential requirements for the course.

<u>Midterm Examination</u> October 10<sup>th</sup>, 2024. From 9:30-11:30 am. In-person during our regular class time in our classroom location. Worth 30% of final mark. No electronic devices allowed during examination.

The midterm exam will cover all course readings, lectures, and any videos covered from first class until October 10<sup>th</sup> 2024. It will be a mixed format, constituting of multiple-choice questions and two short essay questions.

Instructors are permitted to designate one assessment per course per term as requiring supporting documentation to receive academic consideration. For this course the following assessment has been designated as requiring supporting documentation: MIDTERM EXAMINATION HELD ON OCTOBER 10<sup>TH</sup> 2024 FROM 9:30-11:30 AM IN-PERSON, WORTH 30% OF FINAL MARK.

<u>Final Exam:</u> **TBA. Worth 35% of final mark.** Two-hour exam. It will be held in-person during final examination period. It will be a cumulative exam, covering all course material. It will be a mixed format, constituting of defining and explaining key concepts and one long essay question. No electronic devices allowed during examination.

Essay Assignment: Due November 21, 2024<sup>th</sup>. To be submitted on online on OWL as a Word document. Worth 35% of final mark. It must be double-spaced, of a minimum 2500 words count (approximately 10 pages), 11-font size, plus additional bibliography page and title page. More details on essay instructions, topics, and guidelines will be distributed to the class at beginning of term, on OWL.

Please note that this is an essay-designated course. As per Western academic regulations as set out in the Academic Calendar, for a student to pass a designated course (an E, F, or G course) they must demonstrate competence in essay writing. That is, to pass this course, you **must** pass the essay component.

Students are expected to submit the assignment by the deadline listed above. Should illness or extenuating circumstances arise, students are permitted to submit their assignment up to 72 hours past the deadline without academic penalty. Should students submit their assessment beyond 72 hours past the deadline, a late penalty of 5% per day will be subtracted from the assessed grade. As flexible deadlines are used in this course, requests for academic consideration will not be granted. Students with an Accessible Education Plan who require additional supports are encouraged to speak with their instructor.

Students with an approved absence from an in-class test or exam will be required to write a makeup exam. Course professor or teaching assistant(s) may not be available to respond to questions during the makeup exam. Students should be aware that the make-up test will not necessarily be in the same format, be of the same duration, or cover the same material as the original test.
