# **Course Description:**

Mandatory for third-year Sociology students in an Honours Specialization. Students will learn to investigate the social world using content analysis, various methods of observation, and different types of interviewing. Particular attention will be paid to the relationship between epistemology and qualitative research approaches. Students will participate in research practice exercises. Ultimately, students will learn to think critically about sociological research.

*Prerequisite(s):* Sociology 2206A/B.

Unless you have either the requisites for this course or written special permission from your Dean to enroll in it, you may be removed from this course and it will be deleted from your record. This decision may not be appealed. You will receive no adjustment to your fees in the event that you are dropped from a course for failing to have the necessary prerequisites.

# **Course Objectives and Learning Outcomes:**

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- Develop skills around how to collect, manage, analyze, and interpret qualitative research data
- Formulate research questions and choose a qualitative research design to examine those questions
- Understand and meet the ethical standards for conducting research with human subjects, including research in online spaces
- Design and carry out a research project, including conducting in-depth interviews, ethnographic field observations, and content analysis
- Analyze and interpret qualitative data

Demonstrate academic integrity in assessed work through appropriate use of academic citation and referencing conventions.

# **Course Material:**

There is no single textbook students need to purchase, however this course draws heavily from *Social Research Methods:* 6<sup>th</sup> edition (\$131). Students are welcome to purchase second-hand or earlier editions of this textbook (starting from \$25). While I recommend you access the most recent edition, any edition will do. You can purchase various editions online or through Amazon or access the book through the University Library

Other weekly readings will be assigned and posted on OWL Brightspace at no charge to you.

### **Evaluation Details:**

<u>Class Attendance</u>: Class attendance is expected and students must attend at least 70% of class to pass the course. If you cannot attend a class due to illness or other reasons please inform Professor Mendes ahead of time. This course has 10 days of class and 2 optional 1-1 contact times where you are marked as present or absent. If you have 10 contact points (classes or 1-1 meetings during designated weeks), you will get full marks. Academic consideration will not be granted for missed days.

<u>In-depth interview proposal</u>: Identify a sociological problem on your own or in a group. Identify research questions. Create a draft interview guide; Describe your recruitment strategy; discuss ethical considerations; produce your letter of information and consent form.

Length: 6-8 pages, double-spaced

<u>Ethnography Assignment</u>: Spend some time (min 2 hours) observing a specific site; collect field notes. Write a short essay describing your observations, and the challenges of being an observer

Length: 8-10 pages, double-spaced

Please note that because the submission deadline for this assessment already includes flexibility in the form of grace days [a 48-hour submission window with no academic penalty], Professor Mendes reserves the right to deny academic consideration for assignments which are submitted following the end of the period of flexibility.

Grace days: For each assignment, students are expected to submit the assignment by the deadline listed. Length: 1-2 pages, double-spaced

Please note that because the submission deadline for this assessment already includes flexibility in the form of choosing which 5 classes to reflect upon, Prof. Mendes reserves the right to deny academic consideration for this assignment. It is recommended that you submit your reflections weekly as you go, but all 5 reflections must be submitted by 25<sup>th</sup> March 2025. The assignment is graded based on a pass/fail and students will receive a fail if they submit less than 5 reflections.

Interview transcription, analysis and write-up: Conduct an interview (over zoom, face-time or phone). Transcribe the interview and analyse it for themes related to your research questions. Write a brief report on your findings. Submit your transcription, your thematic coding notes, and a brief write-up on your findings as well as a reflection on the experience including what worked and what you would change if you could do it again.

# **Use of Generative Artificial Intelligence (AI):**

Within this course, students are permitted to use AI tools exclusively for information gathering and preliminary research purposes. These tools are intended to enhance the learning experience by providing access to diverse information sources. However, it is essential that students critically evaluate the obtained information, exercise independent thinking, and engage in original research to synthesize and develop their own ideas, arguments and perspectives. The use of AI tools can serve as a starting point for exploring a topic, with students expected to uphold academic integrity by appropriately attributing all sources of information and avoiding plagiarism. Essays, written assignments and/or lab reports should reflect the student's own thoughts and independent written work. Students should also generate their own figures (e.g., graphs, diagrams) rather than using AI generated ones. By adhering to these guidelines, students contribute to a responsible and effective learning environment that promotes critical thinking, independent inquiry and all them to produce original written contributions. The same principles also apply to the use of translation software to support the writing the essays and other written assessments.

### **Electronic Devices:**

Students may bring and use technology such as laptops in class to take notes, follow along with course material, and access the internet when prompted. Laptops and phones may be used to complete all assignments.

Students must write their assignments in their own words. Whenever students take an idea from another author, they must acknowledge their debt both by using quotation marks where appropriate and by proper referencing such as footnotes or citations. Plagiarism is a major scholastic offence.

All required papers may be subject to submission for textual similarity review to the commercial plagiarism detection software under license to the University for detection of plagiarism. All papers submitted for such checking will be included as source documents in the reference database for the purpose of detecting plagiarism of papers subsequently submitted to the system. Use of the service is subject to the licensing agreement, currently between The University of Western Ontario and Turnitin.com (https://www.turnitin.com/).

Students are expected to retain all research notes, rough drafts, essay outlines, and other materials used in preparing assignments. In the unlikely event of concerns being raised about the authenticity of any assignment, your instructor may ask you to produce these materials; an inability to do so may weigh heavily against you.

Computer-marked multiple-choice tests and/or exams may be subject to submission for similarity review by software that will check for unusual coincidences in answer patterns that may indicate cheating.

**Copyright:** Students may not record or distribute any class activity, including conversations during office hours, without written permission from the instructor, except as necessary as part of approved accommodations for students with disabilities. Any approved recordings may only be used for the student's own private use.

Supporting documentation for academic considerations for absences due to illness must include the completed Western Student Medical Certificate (SMC) <a href="https://registrar.uwo.ca/academics/pdfs/student-medical-certificate.pdf">https://registrar.uwo.ca/academics/pdfs/student-medical-certificate.pdf</a> or, where that is not possible, equivalent documentation by a health care practitioner. Students must request academic consideration as soon as possible and no later than 48 hours after the missed assessment.

Once the request and supporting documentation have been received and reviewed, appropriate academic consideration, if granted, shall be determined by the instructor in consultation with the academic advisor, in a manner consistent with the course outline. Students with an approved absence from an in-class test or exam will be required to write a makeup exam, unless otherwise specified in the course outline. The course instructor or teaching assistant(s) may not be available to respond to questions during the makeup text/exam. Students should be aware that the make-up test/exam will not necessarily be in the same format, be of the same duration, or cover the same material as the original test/exam.

**Note:** missed work can *only* be excused through one of the mechanisms above. Being asked not to attend an in-person course requirement due to potential COVID-19 symptoms is **not** sufficient on its own. Students should check the Western website to see what directives for Covid are to be followed. Western has been and will continue to follow directives established by the Middlesex-London Health Unit. That directive will state whether students should or should not come to campus/class and any other requirements (e.g., masks are mandatory).
